## **Executive Orders (EO)**

An executive order is a directive that is a written, signed, and published by the president of the United States. It states a mandatory requirement for the executive branch. This branch includes the president, the vice president, and the executive departments, such as the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Defense, and the Department of Education. Unlike a law, an executive order does *not* require approval from Congress. An executive order also cannot be overturned by Congress. Only a sitting U.S. president can overturn an existing executive order, by issuing another. But executive orders can be challenged in court.
